

## ADMISSION PROCEDURES

The admission application and fellowship application, along with instructions are available online at <http://gradstudies.ucdavis.edu>. Applications are accepted for Fall Quarter only. Applications must be completed by December 15th and any transcripts must be post-marked by December 15th.

The following information is required and must be submitted online as part of your admission application:

1. Initial Application (online).
2. Application fee of \$80 for domestic applications and \$100 for international applications.
3. Three letters of recommendation. Must be submitted electronically by your letter writer using the online application system.
4. Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores. These scores must be from the last 5 years and should be sent electronically directly from ETS to UC Davis.
5. TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) scores if you have not studied at an institution and received a degree where the language of instruction is English. These scores must be current (from the last 2 years) and should be sent electronically directly from ETS to UC Davis.
6. Writing sample must also be submitted electronically with your online application.

After completing the online admission application, please mail an original copy of your transcript from each higher education institution that you have attended or are currently attending directly to the department. The transcript must arrive in the original sealed envelope as provided by the Office of the Registrar and should be sent to:

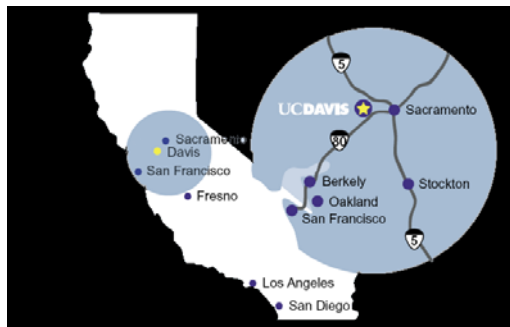

Students are admitted for the joint M.A./J.D. only in conjunction with the UC Davis School of Law.

### PLACEMENT

The success of the Department's graduates is impressive. ### FINANCIAL SUPPORT
